More Dogs are Being Fostered


Over the first few months of the COVID-19 crisis, shelters and rescues report they've gone from 47% of dogs typically in foster to 55% in foster now.



More New People are Trying Fostering

On average, shelters and rescues said that 29% of their current foster parents are first-timers.





But Some Dogs Will Be Returned

About a third (36%) of shelters and rescues are concerned that dogs in foster will be returned following the COVID-19 crisis.
