Since 2008, PEDIGREE Foundation has provided 5,700 grants and over \$9 million to shelters and rescues. But it's possible that our support has never been needed more than in 2020.

The global pandemic brought tremendous challenges, but also amazing stories of shelter and rescue teams, volunteers and foster parents who worked tirelessly to help dogs in need during such a difficult year.

We were honored to support them, including introducing COVID-19 Relief grants in the spring that helped more than 100 shelters struggling due to pandemic-related challenges. In November, we announced our 2020 annual grants, bringing our total grants for the year to \$1 million — a 20 percent increase over 2019.

We are very grateful to our donors and supporters who made this giving possible — and so happy for the pups helped. You can see a few of their stories on the following pages. All together, we anticipate our grants helped over 150,000 dogs in need.

Also in 2020, we were thrilled to support the launch of Human Animal Support Services, a new animal services model whose goal is to keep people and pets together. You can read more about the innovative work they're doing on page 8.

At PEDIGREE Foundation, our vision is a day when all dogs are safe, secure, cared for, fed well and loved. In a tough year like 2020, that vision might seem harder to imagine. But, in fact, we are more optimistic than ever.



Helping one dog is a joy. Helping thousands of dogs is even better! That's why in recent years we have increasingly prioritized support for foster, matching/behavior and transport programs, which have all been shown to significantly increase dog adoption rates. Our grants help shelters and rescues create enduring, successful programs that make dogs more adoptable. See a few of their stories here.





Axis is just one example of more than 50 dogs helped in 2020 by a new "matchmaker" position at Ruff Start Rescue. People looking to adopt often pick out a pup without understanding their energy level and personality. Or, they skip over dogs based on assumptions that don't turn out to be true. With the new matchmaker funded by a PEDIGREE Foundation grant, Ruff Start Rescue can better match dogs with potential adopters. As a shelter/collie mix, Axis needed a family that would understand his athleticism and energy. The Ruff Start Rescue matchmaker found him the perfect home with a knowledgeable and dedicated adopter.



Nico suffered from severe anxiety and behavior issues when he was found as part of a large-scale puppy mill seizure in 2020. Supported by a PEDIGREE Foundation disaster grant, Oklahoma Alliance for Animals took in over 80 dogs, providing them with vaccines and other medical care, as well as extra support for those with special needs. Nico was one of them. He needed help to reduce his anxiety and training to build his trust. With the help of an experienced foster and transport through Reach Rescue, he's now in a loving home with a sweet canine sister he adores.




Angel arrived at Kentucky Humane Society (KHS) after spending 4 years with a family. Adjusting to the shelter was hard and made her stressed, which caused behavioral issues. To give her a break, she took part in KHS's "Date with a Dog" program, supported by a PEDIGREE Foundation grant. On her dates, volunteers found that Angel was a happy, sweet pup who loved to play and go on hikes. Breaks from the shelter helped reduce Angel's stress, and she also got help from the shelter behavior team. Now, she's found a new family and has been adopted into a forever home.

Sabre's life was saved thanks to a PEDIGREE Foundation-supported transfer program that helps over 2,000 pets every year. 

Helping Dogs Nationwide

PEDIGREE Foundation grants span the U.S. Our 2020 grants helped shelters and rescues in 40 states as well as Washington, D.C. and Puerto Rico.



PEDIGREE Foundation grants are typically awarded in November. As a result, the 2020 grants were distributed at the end of the year and are being used now to help dogs across the country. In 2020, we continued to prioritize programs that have a significant impact on dog adoption rates, including matching, foster and transport programs.

2 DOGS RULE.™ Grants

Again in 2020, we awarded a DOGS RULE.™ grant that provides \$100,000 over two years to support a best practice model.



The 2020 recipient, **York County SPCA** in York, PA, received a grant to create an interactive, technology-based kennel card program that helps potential adopters get to know dogs and learn important information about them quickly to increase adoption.

The 2019 recipient, **Ruff Start Rescue** in Princeton, MN, received their second payment in 2020 and continues to develop their "ComPAWtibility Match Program" to increase the number of foster families and foster-to-adopt programs.

A new way to support people and pets.

In 2020, PEDIGREE Foundation became a founding sponsor of Human Animal Support Services (HASS), a new initiative by American Pets Alive! to transform how shelters help pets and their people.

HASS pulls successful ideas from animal welfare, social services, education, public health and other fields to create a range of services that help people and pets stay together. To share more of their vision and how it is transforming communities, we spoke with leaders of the program...

Tell us about HASS. Why was it created and what is it doing?

Dr. Ellen Jefferson, DVM, President and CEO of HASS: The Human Animal Support Services project is meant to fundamentally change the way animal services operate, making them into human and animal support services. It's a shift away from enforcement and taking pets away, to focusing on support to help people be able to keep their pets. It's about elevating people — the human part of the leash — as well as the dog or cat part of the leash.

Kristen Hassen, Maddie's® American Pets Alive! Director:

People are facing more hardship than ever before, and not being able to keep pets causes even more emotional distress. HASS is designed to bring everyone together to try to address these problems. It's a collaborative movement comprised of more than 500 organizations and about 1,000 individual animal welfare professionals innovating to keep more animals with their families and have fewer animals entering the animal shelter system.

Dr. Michael J. Blackwell, DVM, MPH, Director of the Program for Pet Health Equity, University of Tennessee: One of the things that makes me most excited about HASS is the principle of collaborating, of working together and aligning our community resources and activities so we can get better outcomes in safequarding animal welfare, and therefore family welfare.

PILOT SHELTER HIGHLIGHT:

KC Pet Project

We've been building up our foster support network, getting more volunteers involved. writing job descriptions for our volunteers and really expanding these programs. As a result, over 50 percent of our pets are now living in foster homes, and that aives us more resources here at the shelter to be able to provide pet retention programs and support.





What makes the impact of HASS different from prior efforts to advance animal sheltering?

Dr. Jefferson: The HASS project is being developed and driven by the entire industry, from entry level staff all the way up to longtime directors. We are looking at problems that have existed for the industry's entire lifetime — 120 years. By trying to take those apart one by one and building new solutions for those problems, we're able to actually change the entire framework rather than just one program or one intention of animal services.

Matt Pepper, President and CEO, Michigan Humane: The HASS movement is about rethinking how you interact with a community, about seeing the community as partners. It's about looking at all the animal welfare organizations in a community and partnering together toward a common goal of improving the quality of life for everyone — people and pets.

What's an example of the impact it has?

Kristen Hassen: As just one example, this past year an older woman came to a food distribution event and was given two big bags of food for her dog. A few minutes later, one of the volunteers leaving the event saw this woman, in her 80s, walking several miles home in 95-degree heat with these big bags of food. The volunteer was able to give her a ride home, and understanding her situation, was also able to set up delivery for food in the future. That is just one of many examples of the lengths people will go to care for their animals. Instead of asking people to make that choice



When Bud wandered away from his home and ended up at KC Pet Project, the Animal Services officers recognized him. They knew from their work in his neighborhood that Bud belonged to Charles and that Charles was concerned about a tumor on Bud's side. With the goal of keeping pets in homes, KC Pet Project contacted Charles to say they would treat his tumor and bring him home, along with some pet supplies. Having Animal Services officers out in the community, connecting with pet parents, enabled this success story and kept Bud and Charles together.

between caring for themselves or their pets, HASS aims to make it possible for them to get everything they need for their pets so they can also take care of themselves.

What role does support like that of PEDIGREE Foundation play?

Bobby Mann, Maddie's® Human Animal Support Services
Pilot Director: What I love the most about HASS is that it's about
meeting people where they are, understanding that people and
pets are always better together. Thanks to PEDIGREE Foundation,
we're going to be able to do that and so much more.

Kristen Hassen: The partnership between HASS and PEDIGREE Foundation has been critically important. PEDIGREE Foundation's support has allowed us to help so many animals and people — keeping animals in their homes, providing support for dog programs in the shelters, and doing things like teaching shelters how to provide behavioral support for dog owners so that they can keep their pets even when they face hardships and other challenges.

PILOT SHELTER HIGHLIGHT:

LifeLine Animal Project

We created a community programs department and started rolling out a case management approach to assist our community. We expanded our selfrehoming services and worked with our animal services officers so they can refer cases to our community team and help divert animals from coming into our shelter. We also offered temporary boarding or placement assistance to help during this eviction crisis.

What are some less understood or unexpected ways that HASS can make a difference?

Dr. Jefferson: By keeping people and pets together, we're seeing a huge reduction in the amount of effort, time and expense that has to be put into keeping animals at the shelter. When we focus our resources on helping people on the front end, we can reduce the work and expense that has cost governments and shelters so much money over time and use it more effectively.

Diaz Dixon, CEO, Eddy House and Member of HASS Executive Committee: As the CEO of Eddy House, helping youth experiencing homelessness, I see the partnership that we have with animal shelters and animal welfare as really critical. A lot of our kids don't want to come in for services because they're with the pets they love. Collaboration has given us the ability to work hand-in-hand and find wonderful outcomes. At the end of the day, it is a win for both organizations as well as for the kids and the pets that they love.

Michelle Figueroa, HASS Director at Pima Animal Care Center: If you think about it, when you walk your dog around your neighborhood, I bet you know every animal in every yard. But if I ask you if you know the owners' names, probably not. Why? Because animals are our connection to the world.... For us, the main goal for HASS and Pima Animal Care is to provide tools to owners who face barriers in keeping their pets. If we can find solutions to those problems and we can figure out how to keep your animal at home, we will.



What advice would you give to shelters and rescues that want to increase their local impact but aren't yet part of HASS?

Dr. Jefferson: I would recommend that they sign up for our national calls. We do calls on Mondays for all levels of staff and on Fridays for leadership, as well as summits in the middle of the week. Those are great conversations about what is happening in the HASS project as well as tutorials on how to implement small pieces of it.

Kristen Hassen: Our community now has hundreds of organizations and we're all working together to improve animal welfare and human welfare. Sign up at our website — HumanAnimalSupportServices.org — and you'll have access to all the tools, materials and resources that we offer.

PILOT SHELTER HIGHLIGHT:

Baltimore Animal Rescue and Care Shelter

In the timeframe where we would usually take in about 8,000 animals, this past year we kept about 3,000 out of the shelter by keeping them in homes. We also worked hard to continue placing animals during this time, with almost 2,000 adoptions, 2,000 transfers to rescue partners and hundreds of animals going to foster homes. We're really proud of the fact that we've still been able to save all healthy and treatable animals.

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


